

Mayor of Stavanger



February 1—Mayor Annise Parker met with the Mayor of Stavanger, the Honorable Leif Johan Sevland. Houston and Stavanger became Sister Cities in 1980, a relationship which was expanded in 1988 to also include the city of Galveston. A port city as well, Stavanger is the center of the Norwegian oil industry, due to its proximity to major oil finds in the North Sea.

Student Delegation from Dalian, China



February 3—Mayor Annise Parker greeted a delegation of students and teachers from Dalian No. 24 High School, which became Sister Schools with Houston's Lamar High School in 2000. Since then exchanges of students and staff have taken place annually. Participants in the Sister Schools Program stay with host families, attend classes at the hosting institution and experience the cultural life in the host city.

Minister of Housing and Urbanism of the Republic of Mali



February 16—The Minister of Housing and Urbanism for the Republic of Mali, Her Excellency Gakou Salimata Fofona, visited Houston to promote business ties. Minister Fofona's government has contracted a Houston company to build a federally funded shopping center and low-income housing in Mali.

Delegation from Guangzhou, China



February 1—Mayor Pro Tem Ann Clutterbuck met with the Vice Chairman of the China Foreign Trade Center, Mr. Ren Xiangdong provided information on the Canton Fair. The Fair, which is held biannually in the city of Guangzhou, is China's largest merchandizing exhibition; Due to the sheer volume of materials to be displayed, the Fair is split into Spring and Fall showing. Mr. Ren invited the City of Houston to attend the 2010 Spring fair.

Delegation from Beijing, China



February 8-25—A high-ranking education delegation from the Haidian District in Beijing, China, arrived in Houston to participate in a two-week training program with local counterparts in the field of education. The Houston Independent School District, (HISD) Cy-Fair Independent School District, Kincaid School, St. John's High School, Lamar High School, Bellaire High School, and Rice University all held meetings along with training sessions where they shared valuable insights into their teaching methods and State of Texas standards. HISD Board President Greg Meyers and State Representative Steve Hochberg also met with the delegation and gave an overview of the State of Texas's education policies. Haidian District is home to many of China's leading institutes of education of secondary and college-level.

Delegation from Turkey



February 25—The Vice President of the Confederation of Businessmen and Industrialists of Turkey (TUSKON), Mr. Ahmet Ciğer, led a delegation to Houston to promote awareness of Turkey's business potential, highlight Houston-Turkey trade ties and provide information on the Turkey-World Trade Bridge business conference, which will be held in June 2010. Mr. Ciğer met with City of Houston Controller Ron Green, Council Member James Rodriguez and Chief Development Officer Andy Icken who have all recognized the immense potential of doing business with Turkey.

Delegation from Hangzhou, China



February 25—City of Houston's Mayor's Office of International Affairs & Development welcomed a delegation from the city of Hangzhou, China, which was led by the Deputy Director of the Foreign Affairs Office, Mr. Xie Chongming. Mr. Xie discussed business opportunities in the areas of IT and healthcare, and expressed interest in collaborating with the Mayor's Office on sending delegations to Houston to further explore these opportunities.

The Seven Mayor's International Affairs & Development Councils

Middle East / North Africa

February 3—The second highest ranking official in the Houston FBI office assigned to Counterterrorism Branch, Mr. Steve Genty, who was the Council's featured speaker, briefed the Council on Houston-area citizen initiatives. The Council also identified future goals and projects, including increasing its membership, connecting with expats living in Houston and holding receptions to expand networking. The Council will also seek to expand contacts with members' countries of origin in an attempt to attract further business opportunities.

Asia / Australia

February 4—The Director of Marketing for the Houston Airport System (HAS), Mr. Genaro Pena, who was the Council's featured speaker, addressed developments in the Airport System. HAS's goals include increasing its overall passenger loads to 80 million annually by 2010, connecting Houston to major cities around the world and implementing its Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan. Vice Mayor Pro Tem Ed Gonzalez greeted the Council and discussed international initiatives. Members also provided updates on activities in their respective community organizations and shared news related to upcoming events.

Africa

February 5—A representative from the City of Houston's "Houston Counts: Census 2010" initiative, Mr. Carl Davis, who was the Council's featured speaker, provided updates on the ongoing efforts. The Council focused on the Texas-Africa 2010 Business Summit and its primary dual-objective of initiating public/private partnerships and promoting economic growth, integration, and free trade between Texas and Africa. Members also discussed progress made on the proposed Africa Trade Mission.

International Frontier

Houston is home to many distinguished individuals who are dedicated to the promotion of Houston on the Global Stage. The featured Houstonian this month is Dr. Laura Murillo, President and CEO of the Houston Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.



Within Harris County, there are an estimated 75,000 Hispanic-owned businesses. According to the “Houston Area” study produced by Dr. Stephen Klineberg of Rice University, 40% of Houston’s population is Hispanic. Of those, 70% are between ages 18-44. This means that the Hispanic community is young, vibrant, growing and “very entrepreneurial,” notes Dr. Laura Murillo, President and CEO of the Houston Hispanic Chamber of Commerce (HHCC).

“The individuals that just settled here to pursue a career usually have developed business skills. There is a broad spectrum of specialized individuals who come here to either start a business or take it to the next level.”

March 2, 2010 will be the 33rd anniversary of the founding of the HHCC. The Chamber, which acts as a business resource to Houston’s thriving Hispanic community, has recently embarked on a stage of impressive growth and significantly enhanced visibility, having been recognized as a National Large Hispanic Chamber of Commerce by the United States Chamber of Commerce. “The HHCC is committed to bringing business here, and that’s why [some] businesses do come here as opposed to going to Miami or other parts of the country,” says Dr. Murillo.

Much of this success has come as a result of the dynamic leadership of Dr. Murillo. A native Houstonian whose parents were originally from Mexico, Dr. Murillo has always lived the values which were instilled in her at an early age: to work hard and educate oneself. As the youngest of nine children, Dr. Murillo learned early on how to distinguish herself: “To become a successful business leader today, you have to have a plan. You need to be persistent and passionate in executing it,” Dr. Murillo notes.

Three years ago Dr. Murillo, in consultation with the Chamber’s Board of Directors, established a road map for sustained and focused economic business

development for members of HHCC: the 10-year Strategic Plan. A source of personal pride to Dr. Murillo, the plan has a persistent focus on service and achievement, and, in her estimation, has propelled the HHCC to be the most influential Hispanic chamber in the city.

The Plan highlights the following objectives: “creating local, national and international business opportunities for newcomers and members; assisting members with procurement opportunities; organizing and sponsoring educational seminars; developing dialogue with elected officials and corporations to advocate on behalf of our members and serving as mentors to Hispanic professionals and business owners.” Another facet is to provide business education to companies and individuals and assist small business owners with any certifications they might need to obtain. In order to stay focused on the goals, the Chamber’s international committee targets specific markets, and connects individuals that have interest in business.

The HHCC is currently working on an upcoming International Summit, which will be held at the Renaissance Houston Greenway Plaza Hotel on March 24. The event will be the first international summit hosted by the HHCC. The summit’s purpose is to promote more comprehensive understanding of import/exports developments to members and gather various business people to Houston in order to exchange ideas and refer business to one another.

The biggest challenge faced by the HHCC today, is to keep up with the exponential growth within such short period of time. There are many opportunities to partner individuals and organizations and help them to keep focus on business and their problems. “We are pleased to have such growth expansion; it is a good problem to have,” admits Dr. Murillo.

World Bank chooses Houston as home to its Private Sector Liaison Program

In December 2009, after more than a year in planning, it was announced that Houston would become the third city in the United States to host a World Bank Group Private Sector Liaison Officer (PSLO) and join the PSLO Network of 100 business intermediary organizations in 81 countries. This coveted position is awarded to business intermediary organizations around the world that pledge to dedicate a minimum of 20 hours per week to educate and inform area companies about World Bank Group products and services.

Five area organizations, the U.S. Commercial Service – Houston Branch Office, City of Houston Mayor's Office, the Greater Houston Partnership, the World Affairs Council of Houston, and the University of Texas's Bureau of Economic Geology, collaborated to finalize the proposal, which was ultimately successful in bringing the PSLO Network to Houston. The Greater Houston Partnership and the World Bank Group signed a Memorandum of Agreement that outlines collaborative efforts to achieve common objectives to promote both trade and investment between the World Bank Group's developing member countries and Houston, Texas. The first PSLO for the city of Houston will be Ms. Jessie Tan.

Mayor appoints a Chief Development Officer

Recognizing the importance of keeping Houston's economy growing and increasing the city's job base, Mayor Annise Parker appointed Andy Icken to be the first Chief Development Officer of the City of Houston. Mr. Icken's responsibilities will include economic development, the Houston Airport System and special projects.

Having accumulated extensive experience as the Deputy Director of the City's Public Works and Engineering Department, Senior Vice President of the Texas Medical Center and a high-ranking executive with ExxonMobil, in addition to serving on the boards of the Houston Minority Business Council and the Santa Maria Hostel, Mr. Icken has a wealth of expertise and connections to draw from.

City of Houston gets serious about Census

The 2010 Census will arrive in mailboxes in March, 2010; the City of Houston is putting together a massive community-wide initiative to make sure that every Houstonian is counted.

The benefits of increasing Houston's response rate are many: A better count improves the possibility of increased funding for hundreds of critical programs serving youth, seniors and others in need, more funding from the Institutes of Health, the National Endowment of the Arts and a dozen other Federal agencies, better highways and more transit investment, another member of Congress and more representation in Austin, and a more accurate picture of our population to use when adding two new City Council Districts in 2011.
